I would like to provide some clarity to last week's article titled, "Scores drop at Dolores schools". The chart posted in the middle of the article titled, "Dolores TCAP Scores" is inaccurate. These data points are student growth scores, not achievement scores. Student growth data is reported for students in grades 4<sup>th</sup> through 10<sup>th</sup> and measures the amount of academic growth our students have gained from year to year. Growth scores of 50<sup>th</sup> percentile, or higher are in the targeted range and are cause for celebration. These scores represent student populations whose learning, when measured using state standards, has exceeded expectations for the year based on the average scores of all the students in Colorado. Student growth data is important, but can be difficult to digest. Typically, we discuss and celebrate achievement scores.

This data is also found on the Colorado Department of Education (CDE) website at <a href="www.cde.state.co.us">www.cde.state.co.us</a> under "School View". Here are some highlights:

#### **Dolores Elementary School**

#### **Reading Achievement**

- Fifth grade exceeded the state average for proficient and advanced in reading.
- Third grade and fifth grade increased the percentage of students scoring advanced in reading with third grade exceeding the state average for the percentage of students scoring advanced.
- Third grade and fifth grade had fewer students scoring partially proficient than the state.

## **Writing Achievement**

- The fourth and fifth grades met the state average for the percentage of students scoring proficient and advanced. Fifth grade exceeded the state average.
- The fourth grade improved their writing scores over the previous year.
- Both cohort groups (3<sup>rd</sup> to 4<sup>th</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> to 5<sup>th</sup>) increased the percentage of students scoring proficient or advanced over the previous year.
- Fifth grade exceeded the percentage of students scoring advanced.

### **Math Achievement**

• Fifth grade exceeded the state average in the percentage of students scoring proficient and advanced.

#### Math Growth

• Fourth grade increased the percentage of students categorized as improving over the previous year.

#### Science

• The fifth grade exceeded the state average in the percentage of students scoring proficient and advanced.

## **Dolores Middle & High School**

**Student achievement has increased on more than half of the content area tests in the Secondary:** 7<sup>th</sup> grade writing, 7<sup>th</sup> grade math, 8<sup>th</sup> grade reading, 8<sup>th</sup> grade writing, 8<sup>th</sup> grade math, 8<sup>th</sup> grade science, 10<sup>th</sup> grade reading, 10<sup>th</sup> grade math, and 10<sup>th</sup> grade science.

## Students beat the State average in 11 of 17 tested areas

### Students have outpaced the state in all categories:

- Overall growth
- Catch-up & Keep-Up
- Graduation rates
- Drop-out rates & Completion rates
- Dropout rate, only 1%

I hope that this information and explanation will help to clarify Dolores Student TCAP data and the misleading newspaper article. The teachers, principals and I dig deeply into this data every fall, before the first day of school and weekly during Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) to assess our students' strengths and needs. We also assess our curriculum and instructional strategies using this data and other data such as the Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA), which is given three times per year. All of this data helps us to make informed educational decisions that continually improve the high quality learning environments here in our Dolores Schools.
